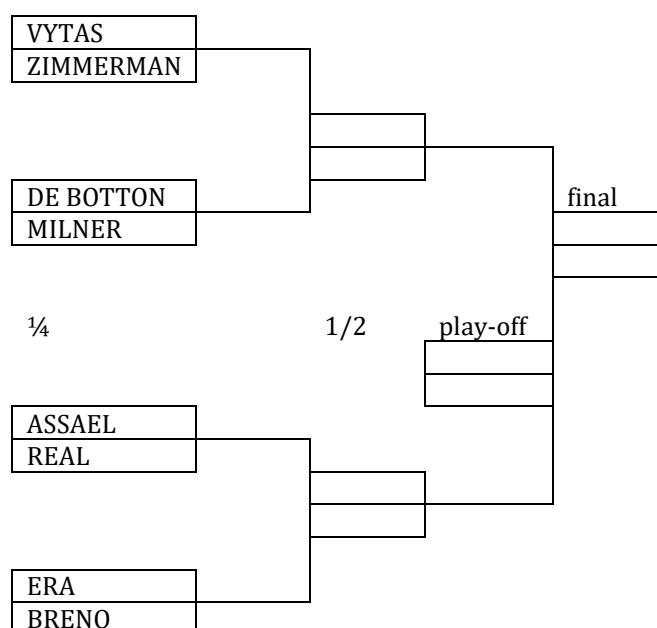

TOUGH GAME

MAZURKIEWICZ had to win twice to advance to the quarterfinals... In the morning it was not so difficult - they won all three parts of the match with total score of 74-44. In the replay after 16 boards they were 22imps behind. Balicki - Żmudziński started their rally:

Zaleski started with ♣K and continued the suit. Club was ruffed at the dummy and a diamond was played to the king. Diamonds were continued. East, after the ace of diamonds, played a spade to partner's ace and one more spade was played. King from dummy and declarer could not get wrong - he cashed two top hearts and claimed when the queen fell down. +790 and 14imps for Mazurkiewicz.

The defensive play of Balicki - Żmudziński is regarded as one of the best of the world, particularly at partscore. Look at the example:

Declarer ducked in the dummy. South took the trick with the king and returned the suit. Declarer took the trick with the ace, and played a spade to the king, making 7 tricks and scoring +90.

Balicki made another choice - ♥4. How it worked? Declarer took in the hand with the king and played a spade to the jack. Adam took the trick and defenders played four rounds of diamonds. To the last one there was no obvious discard. Declarer decided for clubs from both hands, Balicki discarded small heart. Now a heart was played, taken with the jack and spade king followed. Ace and a club jack. Small from dummy, king of Żmudziński and one more heart... Declarer could reduce the loss to one down, guessing the spade, but he did not. 200 for NS and another 7 imps for Mazurkiewicz.

Before the last board Mazurkiewicz led at the segment 32-0 and at the match by 10 imps. But at the last board Mazurkiewicz - Wujków missed 8-card spade fit and played 3NT down one, while Franchi - Zaleski 4♠+2 and finally BRENO won by one single imp - 53-22 and went into quarterfinal.

MATCH OF THE DAY

The most sensational result today was the morning defeat of the top seeded team of VYTAS against winners of the B-final of qualification, NeverClaim. Let's look at the few boards of that match:

Gierulski opened strong version of their Polish Club, but after negative 1♦ withdrew. Lead was ♣J. May be declarer could make overtrick, but he started with three rounds of clubs. North ruffed and cashed trump tricks - 8 tricks.

Put yourself at the shoes of Skrzypczak... When commenting on the vue graph, I bat he will bid 4NT after 4♠ and I was right. But later? 5♠ passed out was rather surprising.

In my opinion, pass after the double of 5♠ with North hand is wrong - with so many hearts, partner may not get as many tricks in hearts as he expects, and also can be a slam on NS like here.. Anyway, pas suggested declarer that ♠K is offside, so it resulted in 2 down, and 6 imps for NeverClaim.

First 8 boards ended with the 12-2 for NeverClaim score. But still there were 16 to the end, but...

Gierulski - Skrzypczak being in green vs red usually very aggressively. Here they had to pay the price. Look at the first hand of the second part:

Dragan did not open his 11 count and they managed to stop at the 6 level, gaining 14 imps and the win became a fact.

Final score of the match was 47-9 for the NeverClaim. They really played excellent bridge, with no gifts to the opponents, accurate defence and declarers play.

But in the replay more experienced VYTAS prevailed (59-21) and NeverClaim will have to compete at the Swiss.

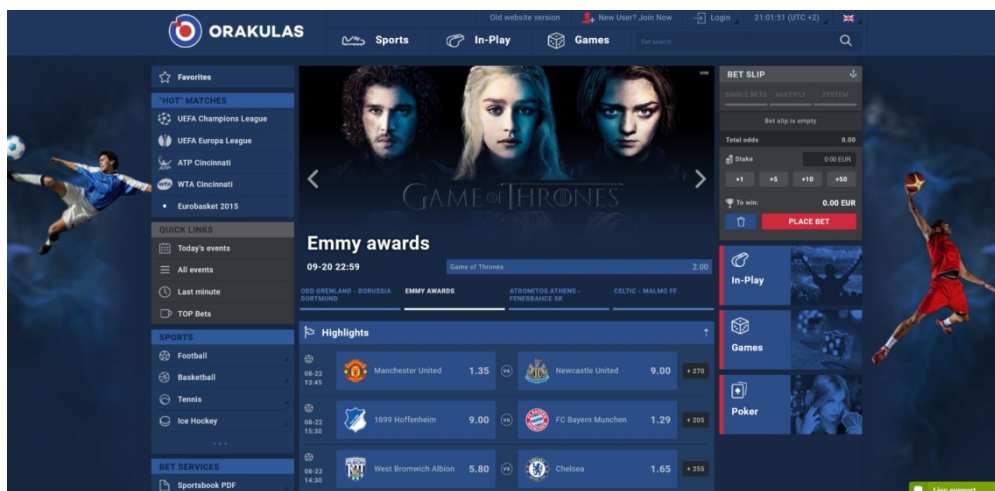
